

Gesture and Contour Still-Life Drawing Handout



Historically, still life drawings and paintings were deeply filled with religious and mythological meaning. Typically comprising an arrangement of objects, like flowers or kitchen utensils, they would be laid out on a table. Still life's was much practiced in the ancient world, but thereafter declined and did not re-emerge in the history of art as an independent genre until the 16th century. By creating their own personalized still life's, students will need to bring in five to six objects from home and setup a still life in drawing studios. Students will be using compressed black and white charcoal on a sheet of drawing paper, modeling the spatial relationships between each object. Students will create a value drawing that emphasizes the relationship their objects in space by creating contrast in the foreground towards the background, understand where the light source is located, making the objects darker as they move back in space and finally creating edges in the foreground crisper and the edges in the background less distinct.

Learning Objectives:

- Identify the differences between Gesture and Contour drawings.
- Create a drawing of objects through direct observation.
- An emphasis on structure within the relationship and arrangement of objects by using various charcoal techniques will be explored.
- Students will understand the variety through contrast and value when using charcoal to successfully depict the illusion of three-dimensional form and space.

Artist Terms:

- Gesture drawing is a method of capturing the form and gesture of a figure quickly and expressively. The artist will focus on the pose and movement of the subject to draw the shape of the figure, rather than focus on drawing the subject accurately or rendering any details.
- A Contour drawing is a drawing technique, whereby the artist outlines the shape and mass of an object or subject. The main details and features are outlined, but small details and value transitions are omitted. In a contour drawing, the artist aims to represent the 'contours' and edges of the form accurately, without portraying volume or depth by shading the light and shadows.
- Value: Element of art associated with the darkness or lightness of a color.
- Grayscale is also known as Achromatic Grayscale, which is the collection or the range of monochromic (gray) shades, ranging from pure white on the lightest end to pure black on the opposite end.
- Light Source: Area in which light is originating from.
- Contrast: Can be created through any difference including value, color, texture, size.
- Shadows: Areas on an object where light does not hit.
